Lombard, within the past few days, has received a number of annonymous letters, some of which were of a threatening tone and related to his attentions to Miss Carpenter. He left a letter to his relatives, saying that he had "fallen a victim to an insatiable passion, and that the natural and spiritual parts of his nature had struggled for the mastery of the passion, but that fate seemed to require it to be explated with his ilfe."
