

Dick Lumbard, of the Eagle Pass Maverick, was shot at this evening by G. W. Farrow, a member of Company F, State troops. The difficulty grew out of the killing of W. C. McCreary in '80, for which Farrow was indicted. On a change of venue the case was transferred to Medina county for trial, where the accused was going to stand trial on Tuesday. The difficulty was crowded on Farrow by Lumbard, who followed him up repeatedly, denounced him as a coward and a cold-blooded murderer. Lumbard's life was saved by one of the proprietors of the saloon in which Farrow entered, who grabbed Farrow's arm in time to change the direction of the ball. Farrow was arrested and lodged in the calaboose and subsequently transferred to the county jail on a charge of shooting with intent to kill. Both parties had been drinking freely.
