

BLANCHE DOUGLAS

AGAIN MARRIED.

LOS ANGELES.--Captain Harrington Reynolds, a former officer in the British Army and for five seasons leading man in T. Daniel Frawley's company, was married Friday noon at Riverside to Blanche Douglas, who received considerable notoriety here recently from a suit brought against her by Adolph Ramish, a Los Angeles contractor, to compel her to return to him jewelry valued at \$550 which he had given or loaned to her.

When Reynolds recently blossomed forth as manager of his own company he secured for his leading lady, Blanche Douglas, also a former member of Frawley's company and where he first met her. It was while playing at the Burbank Theater in this city where they played a two weeks' engagement that Adolph Ramish, a former friend of Blanche Douglas, caused a sensation that nearly disrupted Reynolds' company by invoking the aid of the courts to compel her to return to him the diamonds he had loaned her when they were not so cold toward each other.

Reynolds was very much cut up over the affair, threatened to do all sorts of things to Ramish, and seemed so deeply concerned that it was suspected at the time that he had more than a merely professional interest in Miss Douglas. The latter admitted receiving the diamonds from Ramish, but claimed that they were a gift. The case has not yet been heard.

While playing at Morosco's Theatre in San Francisco eleven years ago, Blanche Douglas met Ralph Cummings and was married to him after a brief courtship. They separated several years afterwards. While in Montreal Mrs. Cummings secured a divorce on a charge of cruelty. Later they were reconciled, and it is claimed by some were remarried. They lived together until Cummings went to Alaska. When Cummings passed through Los Angeles a few weeks ago he is said to have referred to "Miss Douglas" as his wife. If they were remarried, the question is when and where did she obtain her second decree?

The bride formerly resided in Santa Cruz, her parents conducting the Douglas House on Beach Hill.

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
