
LEAVES \$10,000 TO LOUISVILLE WOMAN

DAYTON MAN CUTS OFF HIS
DAUGHTER WITH ONLY
FIVE DOLLARS.

Newport, Ky., April 8.—Charles K. Lombard, of Dayton, who died recently, bequeathed his estate, believed to be worth over \$10,000 to Mrs. Georgiana E. Eastman, of Louisville. To his daughter, Ethelyn M. Lombard, he bequeathed the sum of \$5.

"I cut her off with this small amount," the document states, "because she elected to remain with her mother, then my wife, who refused to come to me for more than six years. I bequeath the balance of my estate to Mrs. Georgiana E. Eastman, residing at 2234 West Walnut street, Louisville, and name her sole executrix without bond."

Lombard was a Mason and prominent member of Granville Moody Post, G. A. R. He also gave instructions that his full military record be engraved on his monument in Evergreen cemetery. It was also his wish that American flags be placed on graves of certain members of the Women's Relief Corps.

Mrs. Georgiana E. Eastman, said to be the beneficiary of a bequest of \$10,000 left her by Charles K. Lombard, of Dayton, is the widow of H. B. Eastman, and resides at 2334 West Walnut street. She could not be found there last night, however, the house being dark and no one being within. Neighbors said that Mrs. Eastman had left the house several days ago, carrying a suitcase and evidently bound for some other city. It is thought that she left for Dayton.
