BRUSH EXPIRES ON TRAIN ENROUTE WEST

TIONAL LEAGUE TEAM.

Body Brought to Indianapolis, Where Funeral Will be Held After His Friends Arrive.

Indianapolis, Nov. 26—The funeral of John T. Brush, president of the New York National league baseball club, who died in his private car, near Seeburger, Mo., while on his way West early today, will be held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Harry Newton Hempstead, in this city, Thursday or Friday. The body is expected to arrive late today, and it will be taken at once to the daughter's home.

Other than that the funeral will be held here, no arrangements have been made. It was decided not to hold the funeral until Mr. Brush's friends from distant parts of the country, could arrive. Burial probably will be here, also.

Mrs. Brush and her daughter, Natalie, are on their way here from Byrn Mawr, Pa., where the daughter is attending school.

Mr. Brush had extensive business interests here. He began his baseball career by purchasing \$25 worth of stock in an Indianapolis baseball club twenty-five years ago.

Mr. Brush, who was seriously ill from locomotor ataxia when he left New York Sunday, failed rapidly on the trip. The railroad company considered detaching the baseball magnate's private car here yesterday, because of his serious condition, but they decided later to attempt to rush him to the Pacific coast. A pint of oxygen was placed in the car at St. Louis for emergency use.
