

FUNERAL OF COL. S. F. SCOTT

MANY OF HIS ASSOCIATES IN EARLY DAYS WERE IN ATTENDANCE.

Services at the House Were in Charge of the Rev. S. A. Northrop — At the Grave the Ritualistic Services of the Elks Was Read.

Seven hundred persons attended the funeral of Colonel Samuel F. Scott yesterday afternoon at the family residence, 2645 Wabash avenue. When the casket borne by men with whom Colonel Scott had been closely associated reached the hearse the street was filled from curb to curb and from the corner where the home stands half way down the block with the multitude of mourners. A line of Elks four hundred strong followed the hearse on foot as far as Fifteenth street and Prospect avenue. Six special cars carried others to the Mount Washington cemetery, where the body was placed in the receiving vault, to remain there until such time as it is convenient to transfer it to the Elks' lot.

Outside of Colonel Scott's family, the only relatives who were able to attend the funeral were Thomas Scott, a brother, with his wife and children who arrived yesterday morning from Chicago.

MANY OLD TIMES AT THE FUNERAL.

At the receiving vault the funeral procession was met by the Elks in cortege formation. The burial rite of the order was gone through with at the grave, concluding with the dropping of bouquets of amaranth and ivy upon the casket, one from each of the Elks who attended the grave ceremony. MANY FLORAL TRIBUTES.

The ceremonies, one of which was performed by Dr. Stephen A. Northrop at the house, the other in charge of the Elks and led by Exalted Ruler Cyril Lechtman at the grave, were brief. The body lay on a catafalque backed with flowers in the parlor of the Scott home. A blanket of roses, the offering of the William Warner club, covered the casket. Other elaborate floral tributes that stood about the bier were a star and crescent design from the city hall employees, a profusion of roses from the Elks' lodge, a pillow from the postoffice employees and a great bunch of chrysanthemums from the Elks of Excelsior Springs. The Rev. J. L. McKee, pastor of the Fifth Presbyterian church opened the services with a prayer. Harry Haley sang "Nearer, My God, to Thee," after which Dr. Northrop delivered a brief eulogium.

At the conclusion of the funeral address friends were permitted to view the body and for fifteen minutes a file of them passed through the home.
