

Distressing Accident.

Worcester, June 5.—Drowned, in the pond near the centre of Sutton, on the 29th ult. Miss Nancy Tenney, daughter of Daniel Tenney, Esq. aged 14 years; Miss Adeline Lombard, daughter of Mr. Nathan Lombard, aged 17; and Misses Hannah G. and Mary H. Marble, aged 22 and 24, daughters of the Widow Sally Marble, all of Sutton.

About 4 P. M. fourteen youths, of both sexes, crossed the pond in two boats. About an hour before sunset they attempted to return, six in one boat, and the rest, five young ladies, (including those mentioned above,) and three young men, in the other. When more than half way over, the rocking of the latter boat, occasioned by the exertions necessary to row it, admitted some water.—Alarmed at this, one of the females “attempted to change her position;” when the boat upset in water twenty feet deep. The three young men, and one of the females succeeded in regaining the boat, and in supporting themselves across the bottom, until they were relieved by those in the other.—The body of one of the four lost, was soon found floating near the place of the accident—that of another was taken from beneath the boat after it was drawn ashore. Attempts were made to resuscitate both, but without success. Those of the other two were found in the afternoon and evening of the following day. On Friday, the 31st, they were interred in one grave, after a prayer by Rev. Mr. Holman, of Douglas, and a solemn and impressive discourse by the Rev. Mr. Mills, of Sutton.
