

WILL ANALYZE STAINS ON PONTIAC SUSPECTS' SUITS

Ann Arbor Expert to Determine
if Substance is Blood; Six
Now Held in Breyer Murder.

Pontiac, Mich., Jan. 15.—Today a deputy sheriff took the clothing of Joseph Lombard, 59, the sixth suspect in the John Breyer murder case, to Ann Arbor for analysis to ascertain whether stains found on the sleeves of the man's coat were blood.

Lombard was arrested when he attempted to sell several old coins at a local jewelry store. Breyer's son detected the man selling the coins. A number of old coins are missing from Breyer's shop.

An inquest in the murder case was held today and the jurors found Breyer came to his death at the hands of persons unknown. The clothing of Michael Kaffman, the Detroit nephew of the victim, also was taken to Ann Arbor for analysis of stains.

The prosecutor's office announced tonight it had a man who will swear he saw Kaffman here Friday, the day Breyer is supposed to have been murdered, in spite of the fact that Kaffman declares he was in Detroit all day. The six suspects, Joe Dunbar, Joe Lombard, Max Kaffman, Griffin and "Sid" Bradburn, will be held until the clothing of the two men has been examined.
